FCC's USF Reform Could Hurt Rural Telcos


Over the past year, we've discussed the FCC's National Broadband Plan that was to overhaul much of the existing support that is given to ensure that all Americans have affordable access to communications services. We've urged members to contact Congressmen and the President, urging them to save rural broadband, and many of you have. However, on November 18, 2011, the FCC released their order for Universal Service Fund (USF) and Intercarrier Compensation (ICC) reform. WCTA staff and industry experts have been poring over the 740-page order to determine how it will affect us.

Some of the changes in the order come as no surprise but will still adversely affect our bottom line. Many of the old methods by which we previously recouped our high-cost loop and switching investments will eventually be reduced or eliminated.

All of the reforms will be phased in—some in as short of a timeframe as the next six months, but many over the course of the next five to ten years, to allow us time to adjust our business plans.

Many of the old funds being eliminated will be replaced with new funding avenues, such as a "recovery mechanism" through the newly created "Connect America Fund." We are still investigating how our bottom line will be impacted once it's all said and done.

New Intercarrier Compensation rules should help reduce the call termination problems we've been seeing caused by unscrupulous companies trying to avoid our terminating fees. VoIP calls will also no longer be able to get a free ride on the USF-funded network.



The FCC is still taking comments on many of the details of the orders and the details are still being hashed out. The FCC will also face numerous legal challenges to implementing the changes to USF that the order addresses including lawsuits brought forth by NTCA, AT&T, several rural companies, and public utilities commission.

We should know more clearly how these orders will affect us in the coming weeks, and will work to keep you informed.

A popular little angel on Valentine's Day, this mythological cherub flew around shooting arrows into one's heart. According to legend, people struck would not perish but live to fall in love with the first person they saw.

Red Roses

They've long been known as the "flower of love" because mythology says roses were the favorite of Venus, Roman goddess of love. The red rose symbolizes love and passion, and giving red roses on Valentine's Day is a cherished tradition.



In light of the increased use of wireless phones, cordless phones, and VoIP, WCTA wants to remind you that these types of telephone technology may not work if electricity goes out due to the snow and ice of winter storms. One item to always have on hand is a corded landline phone that plugs into the phone jack in the wall. Since a corded phone does not require electricity, it can be your backup method of communication during and after a storm—keeping you connected to emergency personnel, family, and friends.

It's important to understand:

- Once batteries wear out, cordless phones and laptops require electricity and will not continue to work during a power outage.
- Wireless phone systems and towers are not required to provide backup power, so wireless phones may not operate during a power outage either.

For safety's sake, we urge you to keep at least one corded landline phone in your home, along with a flashlight and other emergency items.

FRS College Scholarship Program

West Central Telephone has teamed up with The Foundation for Rural Service (FRS) to offer the FRS Scholarship to our members' high school seniors. The FRS college scholarship program awards 30 scholarships in the amount of \$2,500 each to winning applicants across the nation. By partnering with the FRS, West Central Telephone is able to make the scholarship program available to high school seniors in our area.

Applicants must:

- Be a graduating high school senior.
- Receive local telecommunications service from a current NTCA member (except for students sponsored by an associate member company) and be from a rural area.
- Be accepted by an accredited two- or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school.
- Have at least a C grade point average (GPA). FRS scholarships will be awarded to deserving students whose academic credentials fall within an average to above-average range.
- Express an interest to return to a rural community following graduation.
- Be sponsored by a contributor to, or supporter of, the Foundation for Rural Service.

Applications forms have been mailed to guidance counselors at all area high schools. The applications are easily reproduced and can also be downloaded from the FRS Website at http://www.frs.org.
